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## ABSTRACT

This is a critical study of the image of the relationship between the Indians and the English in India from the turn of the century to Independence as seen in selected works of Rudyard Kipling, D.H. Lawrence, George Orwell, and John Masters. The problem arising from this relation is discussed, examined and analyzed in terms of each author's particular perspective on the problem, in terms of the historical development of British colonialism in India, and in terms of the literary means by which each writer expresses his point-of-view.

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
