

Appendix B Subjects and their information

Subjects and Their Information

The subjects or the subjects of this study consisted of 61 people: 15 Thai males, 15 Thai females, 15 Japanese males, and 16 Japanese females. All Japanese subjects were in Bangkok. Most Thai subjects came from various parts of Thailand and stayed in Bangkok during the time of data collection. Some lived in Lamphun, a small northern province 24 km south of Chiang Mai.

Thai male subjects aged between 15-44 years. They were from several areas of career. 33.33 % was students, 20 was freelance traders, 13.33 % was security guards, and 33.33 % was from other professions. Among these 15 subjects, only 20 % stated in the Perception Data Sheet that they could not drive. 40 % stated they had driven for more than 5 years, 20 % for 1-3 years, and 13.33 % for 3-5 years. 48.89 % do not speak any foreign language. Among those who can speak foreign languages, no one speaks excellent foreign languages. English is the foreign language that most Thai males stated that they were able to speak with an equal number of 26.67 % who speak English poorly and fairly. Concerning their educational background, 20 % completed their 4-year primary education following the national curriculum of the old days and 6.67 % completed 6year primary education. An equal number (13.33 % each) of subjects completed lower-secondary education and Master Degrees while those who finished upper-secondary level and Bachelor Degrees was 20 % each.

Thai female subjects aged between 18-48. They have different professions which comprised mainly students, office workers, traders, and maids plus a nurse, a housewife, an operator, a government officer, and a non-permanet employer. 40 % of all Thai female subjects interviewed stated that they did not speak any foreign languages. 33.33 % speak fair English as foreign language while other 13.33 % speak poor English. German, Chinese, French, and Korean are other languages stated by some subjects that they could speak either fairly or very little. There were only two female Thai subjects who said that they spoke excellent Cantonese. 53.33 % said that they did not know how to drive. People who could drive and have driven for less than one year and for 1-3 years are made of 6.67 % each. 13.33 % has driven for 3-5 years while 20 % has driven for more than 5 years. For the subjects' education, 33.33 % finished 4-year primary education and 6.67 % finished 6-year education. 20 % completed upperlevel secondary education. 13.33 % was the figure of the following groups: lower-level secondary education, Bachelor Degrees, and Master Degrees.

Japanese male subjects' ages range from 21 to 62 years, in which 60 % of them was under 30 years of age. students were 26.67 % and engineers, businessmen, and teachers each made 20 % of all the people participated in the experiment. The rest was from other jobs and those who did not disclose what they did. Only one male participant said that he did not speak any foreign languages despite having lived in Thailand for some years already. 66.67 % of the subjects in this group chose "fair" for their English ability. 53.33 % told the researcher that they spoke fair Thai, but, from two-time pre-experimental and post-experimental interviews, it seemed they could have outperformed the language ability they had stated. Other languages that the subjects stated as "fair" and "poor" levels include German and Chinese. 93.33 % of the subjects in this group can drive with 13.33 % having 1-3 year driving experience, 20 % having 3-5 driving experience, and 60 % having 5 year up driving experience. One Japanese male did not want to reveal his educational background, but works as an editor for a Bangkok-based Japanese newspaper company. He only stated his responsibilities involved editing news stories and checking on the news translated from the English language newspaper. The researcher assumes that he must have at least completed a junior-high level because he would not have been able to take such responsibilities if he had been an uneducated person. This makes him eligible to be included in the group. Most Japanese male subjects (73.33 %) received Bachelor Degrees.

As for Japanese female subjects, their ages range from 23 to 54 years old. Similar to their Japanese male counterparts, 60 % of them was below 30 years of age. 73.33 % was students and the rest included those with other jobs such as editor, writer, and housewife and those who did not reveal their professions. Like Japanese males, most have been living in Thailand for less than 5 years. Some traveled frequently between Thailand and Japan. English and Thai were the only two languages this group of subjects could speak. 60 % spoke fair English and 26.66 % spoke fair Thai. The rest stated they both fair Thai and English or spoke poor English or Thai. 20 % of all subjects in this group cannot drive. 6.67 % had 1-3 year driving experience, 20 % had 3-5 year experience, and 40 % had 5 year up driving experience. The rest was those who stated they could drive, but failed to give the information concerning the period they have been driving. Graduates and post-graduates were made up of 40 % each. 13.33 % was Ph.D. subjects while only 6.67 % finished 2-year college and another 6.67 % gave the information in "other" for educational background.
